Religions we got to know during this youth exchange

Orthodox Christianity is a branch of Christianity that emphasizes the traditions and teachings of the early Church, including the belief in one God as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It values sacraments, the veneration of icons, and the intercession of saints. It has a hierarchical structure, a highly ritualistic liturgy, and a rich history and culture.





Islam is a monotheistic religion based on the teachings of the Prophet Muhammad. It emphasizes the belief in one God, submission to God's will, and the accountability for one's actions. The Five Pillars of Islam are central to its practice. Islam has a rich history and culture and is the second-largest religion in the world with over 1.8 billion followers.

Sikhism is a monotheistic religion that was founded in the 15th century in the Punjab region of India by Guru Nanak and nine successive Sikh Gurus. It emphasizes the belief in one God, with the holy book being the Guru Granth Sahib, which is considered the living Guru. Sikhism places great importance on spiritual equality, social justice, and selfless service, and the Five Ks are important symbols of Sikh identity. The ultimate goal of Sikhism is to achieve union with God through meditation and ethical living.





Judaism is a monotheistic religion that originated in the Middle East over 3,000 years ago. It is based on the belief in one God who revealed himself to Abraham, Moses, and the prophets of Israel. The Torah is the central text of Judaism. Judaism emphasizes the importance of observing the commandments, or mitzvot, which include the Sabbath, prayer, charity, and ethical behavior.

Roman Catholicism is a branch of Christianity led by the Pope. It believes in one God and the holy trinity, and holds the Bible and Church traditions as authoritative. Sacraments, the veneration of Mary and saints, and a hierarchical structure are central. Its liturgy is highly ritualistic and ceremonial, and it has a rich history and culture.





Buddhism, founded by Siddhartha Gautama, teaches that life is characterized by suffering caused by craving and ignorance. It offers the Four Noble Truths and the Eightfold Path as a way to end suffering and achieve enlightenment (Nirvana). There are two main branches: Theravada, focusing on individual liberation, and Mahayana, emphasizing compassion for all beings. Buddhism's core practices include meditation, ethical living, and mindfulness.





The youth exchange "The Spirits of Religions" is the camp organized by IniciativAngola. In this year's international religious camp we were together from Serbia, Slovenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Turkey, Syria, Iran, Hungary, and Austria.

By the faith we are Catholic and Orthodox Christians, Muslims and Atheists. To get to know other religions we invited guests to represent the religions, for example Buddhism, Sikhism, Judaism and Protestantism.







This was our first morning all together. After a quick run that the Slovenian group prepared for the energizer, everyone stayed outside to hear the big introduction to this camp.

We were split into international groups that will be kept until the end of this camp, all the tasks shall be departed by international groups. We got some time to think about a group name and show our creativity with a poster. The names of our international groups are Bears, Archers, Bass Team, 10 balls, Minions and Kings. At the concert Rock4Angola in Bleiburg/Pliberk, four bands were playing for a good cause.


The first gig started at 19:00 and the concert lasted until 23:30.

In the afternoon, we had the opportunity to hear more about Sikhism and Catholicism in Uganda.


Today we spent our daily MyTime by the lake, listening to the sounds of nature.


